Pharmacy First

Going to your local pharmacy offers an easy and convenient way to get clinical advice on minor health concerns, and now community pharmacies can offer treatment for seven common conditions without patients needing to see a GP, as part of a major transformation in the way the NHS delivers care.

Highly trained pharmacists at more than nine in ten pharmacies can now assess and treat patients for earache, impetigo, infected insect bites, shingles, sinusitis, sore throat, urinary tract infections (UTIs) for women aged 16-64 - without the need for a GP appointment or prescription.

Community pharmacy teams are highly-skilled, qualified health professionals who have the right clinical training to give people the health advice they need. Patients don't need an appointment and private consultation rooms are available. Pharmacy teams can also signpost to other relevant local services where necessary.

Pharmacists have always helped patients, families and carers in their communities stay healthy and are well placed to offer treatment for health conditions. By expanding the services community pharmacies offer, the NHS is aiming to free up GP appointments and give people more choice in how and where they access care.

Don't wait for minor health concerns to get worse – think pharmacy first and be seen by your local pharmacy team.

Dentistry in Dorset

In February 2024 NHS England launched a national plan for NHS dentistry services in England. Here in Dorset, we recognise that things need to improve and welcome the plan which aims to give better access to dental services, setting out the steps to make accessing dental care easier and faster, including:

- £200m of new national funding from the Government
- Creation of up to 2.5 million more appointments nationally
- Up to 1.5 million more treatments in NHS dentistry

In the plan there are three main areas of focus:

- Improving Access
- Growing and supporting the workforce
- Supporting prevention

Services throughout the county have been under pressure for some time despite teams working hard to meet the rising demand, and while we have seen some improvements in access, more needs to be done to ensure that everyone who needs to see a dentist, can do so.

In Dorset we are:

- Planning improved dental access in underserved areas. This includes improving access to urgent and stabilisation programmes
- Improving access for people who have not been to a dentist in two or more years

• Encouraging dentists to work in areas which historically have been difficult to recruit to

- Increasing the minimum unit of dental activity (UDA) value from the £23 to £28 from April 2024
- Dorset has been named one of a handful of areas in England who will be part of a national programme to introduce a dental bus.

Swap 2 Stop initiative in Dorset

Public Health Dorset is launching a new Swap 2 Stop offer to support residents to quit smoking and improve public health across the county.

The Swap 2 Stop scheme, part of a government funded programme, encourages adults who smoke to switch from smoking to vaping, which is much less harmful to health.

LiveWell Dorset will deliver the programme by offering smokers a voucher for a free vape starter kit, from a trusted supplier.

Smoking remains the single biggest cause of preventable death in the UK; it kills up to two out of three long-term users and around 64,000 people each year. While nicotine is the addictive substance in cigarettes, almost all of the harm from smoking comes from the toxic chemicals in tobacco smoke, the vast majority of which are not present in vapes.

Vaping is much safer than continuing to smoke and people who do switch should eventually look to quit vaping too once they're sure they won't return to smoking, which we know poses a far greater risk to health.





STAYING SAFE FROM SCAMS

This month an update on some old scams and some new ones that have appeared recently.

Funeral Scam

I didn't think the scammers could stoop much lower but there are a number of reports of the recently bereaved being specifically targeted. On the day of a funeral family and friends are sent a link on social media that looks like it comes from legitimate funeral directors and claims to let those unable to attend watch the service online. Those who click on the link are asked for payment details. The scammers even go so far as to copy pictures of the recently deceased from real funeral directors' sites and actively seek out and target the families involved on Facebook.

Funeral directors will never ask for mourners to pay to live stream a funeral.

DVLA Scam

A scam email claiming to be from the DVLA is doing the rounds again telling you that 'you are not up to date with your current vehicle tax' and threatens you with a fine or other penalties if you don't pay. A link is included to complete a form to 'be up to standard with the DVLA legal requirements'. The form is, of course fake, and is simply a way for the hackers to steal your data.

DVLA will never send e-mails of this kind. If in doubt contact them directly

Action Fraud has issued a warning about social media hacking after 22,530 people reported that their accounts had been hacked in 2023. With access to your accounts, fraudsters can con your contacts, sell your info on the dark web and try to steal your identity. Action Fraud has reported that some victims of email and social media hacking have been extorted by criminals who've stolen their private photos and videos.

There are a number of ways a hacker can gain access:

Data breaches: this is when hackers gain access to a system that holds confidential data on people. Fraudsters can then use this data to gain

Responding to a phishing message: scam messages that impersonate legitimate companies and contain links leading to malicious websites can be used to harvest personal details. Links can download malware to your device that steals your personal data, or cons you into entering your information on a website.

On-platform chain hacking: a fraudster posts links to dodgy websites in the comment section of social media posts, which then asks the victim to enter their social media account details, thereby giving the fraudster access to these details. The fraudster may also message the victim impersonating one of their contacts to try and get them to share their two-factor authentication code.

Credential stuffing: this is when hackers use a password they've stolen for one account to access other accounts from the same person because they have not used different passwords.

Shoulder surfing: this is when a scammer looks over your shoulder and watches you log in to an account.

Malicious apps: dodgy apps created by fraudsters that install malware His secret to a long life - Keep Active.

Advice on how to avoid your accounts being hacked can be found in my previous Marnhull Messenger articles. But if you do get hacked what should you do?

Beware of recovery scammers contacting you on social media telling you that they can get your account back. They can't, and this is just

Go to the help page of your account provider and find out who to contact to get assistance with a hacked account. Ensure you change your password and log out of your account on all devices.

Check to see if any new 'rules' have been set up on your email account that you haven't created. These can control where emails about your account are forwarded to.

Let your contacts know that you've been hacked and that any messages they receive are not from you.

Make sure you change passwords on other accounts in case fraudsters have also hacked into them, and check your bank statement for unauthorised transactions.

If you notice any unusual behaviour on your bank account, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your bank card and report it to Action Fraud - The National Fraud & Cyber Crime Reporting Centre on 0300 123 2040 or at: www.actionfraud.police. uk/reportscam

Belying the work's title, this movement begins with soft woodwind over the distant drums. "O Fortuna" from Carl Orff's "Carmina Burana" is an exquisite tune for the soprano voice and Mike followed with the 2nd movement of Beethoven's 9th symphony which, he assured his audience, had never been played in a MMS programme before.

A traditional piece from Jamaica followed, and very jolly it was too. Several of us commented that it could easily have been mistaken for an Irish folk tune which was an intriguing puzzle. In total contrast was the Russian Creed which followed, with the hypnotic monotonal chant backed by the haunting and almost cavernous rumble of a large choral ensemble. The effect was almost visual and could not have been anything but Russian.

In the second half of the programme Mike's love of Gilbert and Sullivan showed through, and for those of us, like myself, who were brought up on these delightful and pithy little jewels, it was a special treat. He interspersed the operatic interludes with some John Barry and a movement of Mendelssohn's piano concerto No. 1 as well as Bryn Terfel singing Schubert, and wound up the evening with Van Gellis' "Conquest of Paradise."



MARNHULL ENTERTAINS








HOME ENVIRONMENT RISKS TO PETS

Wild Life Wellness

In a few of my recent communication readings with animals I've been asked to convey to their owners the health risks they're being unwittingly exposed to at home. We tend to forget that a dog's sense of smell is 10,000 - 100,000 times more acute than a human's and, surprisingly, a cat can smell out scents over four miles away!

With that in mind, imagine living in a house where air-fresheners, disinfectants, perfumes, polish, and detergents are used regularly. We might not notice the smell of a plug-in freshener constantly on, but they do, and they can't always indicate when they're feeling overwhelmed, nauseous or dizzy from the constant assault on their senses.

So many of these products contain volatile organic compounds (VOCs) - chemicals that quicky evaporate compromising air quality. Many VOCs are carcinogenic and even low exposure holds a potential risk especially when regularly using common household products. We naturally ensure our pets avoid certain houseplants, prescription medications, and human foods like chocolate and raisins, but what not-so-obvious dangers lurk around our homes?

Household Cleaning Products:

Many conventional cleaning products contain chemicals such as ammonia, bleach, and phthalates, which are toxic if ingested or inhaled. Even if they're stored away from your pet, residues left on floors and surfaces can be absorbed through their paw pads or fur, leading to potential health issues. Small changes can make a big difference. Use pet-safe, environmentally friendly cleaning products or natural alternatives like vinegar and baking soda which are effective and cheap. Detergents and fabric softeners cling to clothes and bed linen and are designed to give a longer-lasting scent – just the type of overload pets don't need. Laundry eco eggs, baking soda, and plant-derived washing products reduce pet olfactory discomfort and allergies. Steam cleaning floors, fabrics and work surfaces is 100% chemical free, and proven to kill 99% of bacteria in our homes, along with dust mites and other allergens.

Air fresheners emit large levels of VOCs and are therefore a potential health risk for all the family. There are many natural alternatives to air fresheners e.g. activated charcoal for odour neutralising. Regularly airing your home is also a form of odour control and arguably essential if you're an indoor smoker. Cigarette smoke produces high levels of VOCs leading to respiratory issues and other health problems, and animals are extremely sensitive to this form of pollutant.

Indoor Air Pollution:

Smoking isn't the only in-house air pollutant. Long-term exposure to mould is extremely dangerous and the quicker the problem is addressed the better. In the meantime, ventilate your home well and keep pets away from areas with visible mould growth, particularly black mould, which releases harmful mycotoxins, causing severe health problems if inhaled by pets or humans.

Fragrant candles, wax melts and reed diffusers are also pollutants and may cause respiratory irritation in pets. Cheap products are usually made from low grade paraffin wax and fragranced synthetically, which contain phthalates (endocrine disrupting chemicals). Swap over to soy or bees

wax candles with natural fragrances – but do check whether any essential oils used are toxic to pets.

DIY:

Please consider your pets when decorating. We can smell when a room has been freshly painted, so imagine what it's like to have to live in a newly painted enclosed environment with a highly developed sense of smell. VOCs evaporating from conventional paint as it dries can cause irritation to your pet's eyes and respiratory system, as well as nausea, dizziness and possible allergic skin reactions. Try to decorate at a time of year when you can have windows and doors open for most of the day. Opt for waterbased paints as these contain a lower level of VOCs. You can even buy antibacterial and odour-free paints. And of course, remember in the prep work, that mould spores might be dislodged.

Garden Pesticides and Herbicides:

There are many chemical pesticides and herbicides applied to lawns, gardens, and even indoor plants to control pests and weeds. Pets may inadvertently ingest these chemicals by licking their paws or fur after contact with the treated areas, leading to poisoning and other adverse health effects. Where possible, choose pet-friendly pest control methods and always keep pets away from chemically treated areas for at least 24 hours

We have a responsibility to our pets to ensure their safety and well-being. They can't tell us they're feeling under the weather but there may be signs of short-term VOC exposure: eye/nose/throat irritation, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, itching/rashes. Long-term exposure may lead to cancer or liver/kidney damage. By understanding the potential hazards of home environmental toxins and taking some simple proactive steps to reduce their use we can create a safer living environment for our pets – and ourselves



We meet in Marnhull Village Hall at 7pm (talk starts at 7.30pm) on the second Tuesday of each month except August.

And now some gardening tips for May.

Primroses - If you have ten minutes to spare May is a good time to lift and divide primroses once flowering is finished but leaves are still looking healthy. Lift the entire clump then pull the clump apart into several sections before planting somewhere new in semi shade.

Sweet peas – Use garden twine to tie in the young sweet pea shoots that are beginning to reach out from their supports. Sweet pea stems will sprawl away and drop if left to their own devices and, later, the weight of the flowers will weaken the stems more if they are not well supported. Tie young shoots in close to the supports and they'll create a good structure for flowers to grow and newer shoots will grip with their tendrils.

Basil – grow a few young basil plants close to your tomatoes. Both like the same conditions as well as complementing each other in salads. The scent of basil may also help repel pests such as whitefly.

D Day to Douglas Adams. Sturminster Newton Literary Festival Celebrates Dorset and Wessex Writers.

Sturminster Newton Literary Festival is in its fifth year and has organised a diverse and ambitious programme for 2024. The festival runs from 8th -16th June and includes a special event dedicated to D Day. This year the festival includes a talk on one time Stalbridge resident, Douglas Adams' early work from his colleague Kevin | Davies.

Bridport Prize winner, Fiona Williams will be speaking about her novel, The House of Broken Bricks, set in the Somerset Levels. Colonel Guy Deacon will talk about his inspirational journey driving alone from London to Cape Town while living with stage three Parkinson's Disease.

Local people have contributed testimonies from family members who experienced D Day. These will feature in a special exhibition in The Exchange during festival week. On Sunday 9th June, two speakers, Taylor Downing and James Porter will speak about the deception around D Day and the role of the Dorsetshire Regiment, and some testimonies will be read to mark the official opening of the exhibition.

In the 150th year since Far From the Madding Crowd was published, there will be a special screening of the 2009 Gryphon School film and an opportunity to meet some of the actors. Walks at Bere Marsh, Marnhull, and Bagber combine writing and local literature with the outdoors. On 15th June, Sturminster Newton will be turned into a (legal) crime scene with a special Crime Writing Dav.

A writing workshop and competition along with talks by authors Mark Bridgeman, Jane Labous, and Paula Harmon are likely to be popular with thriller fans. Local writers are speaking on a wide range of subjects this year, including Celia Brayfield speaking about Anna Sewell and her contribution to animal welfare, the Royal Navy through the eyes of author Jim Carter's father, the legend of Inanna and Gilgamesh from Cerne Abbas based writer Emily Wilson, and nature themed poetry from Robin Walter.

Derbyshire based Joanne Burn will join the festival via Zoom to discuss her latest novel, The Bone Hunters, set in Lyme Regis. Festival chairman Pauline Batstone said: "Each year the Sturminster Newton Literary Festival gets better and better and we look forward to greeting even more visitors to this our fifth Festival".

What we're doing

• We've made considerable progress on reviewing the conservation areas to ensure the character of the village is maintained –

something you told us really matters. Similarly we are continuing to review green spaces and local views and our friends at Marnhull Green Teams are helping us by undertaking an ecological survey.

- We have now received the final draft of Design Guidance & Codes which help ensure that new buildings are designed sympathetically and to high standards.
- We are undertaking a survey of possible road safety measures using the Traffic in the Villages Toolkit designed by Dorset AONB (now National Landscapes Dorset).
- Recent events have prompted the need for a closer look at flood mitigation as a key topic within the plan. If you'd like to alert us to particular issues please contact Mark Turner at mark.turner@marnhull-pc.org.uk
- We are continuing to consult with landowners and businesses around the village to understand their needs and aspirations, and are liaising regularly with Dorset Council.
- A early draft of some sections of the plan is being progressed.

We are hoping to secure a further government grant for the work we need to carry out during 2024. As we don't yet know when the funding will become available the Parish Council is being very supportive and has allocated an interim amount so that work can continue.

GRANT FROM NHS CHARITIES TOGETHER



A major grant from NHS Charities Together is enabling the Stars Appeal to fund projects helping local people with cancer and to support staff at Salisbury District Hospital.

The funding, totalling £88,000, is for two separate projects that are providing support for cancer patients and hospital staff.

Cancer patients are benefitting from an enhanced prehabilitation and rehabilitation service which supports their physical and mental wellbeing before or after their treatment or surgery. The grant is funding a 12-session pass for a local leisure centre, which enables patients to continue the fitness activities they have started with the Hospital's Cancer Therapy team.

Consultant Haematologist and Stars Appeal Hospital Ambassador, Dr Effie Grand, said: "The prehabilitation and rehabilitation service is vital for patients. It is not something every hospital does and thanks to the Stars Appeal and this grant from NHS Charities Together we can offer our patients even more support. It makes a huge difference not just to their mental wellbeing during a very stressful time, but also their physical recovery from operations, chemotherapy and other cancer treatments. We're so grateful to NHS Charities Together for this generous grant, which will help us do so much for local cancer patients."

Charles McGrath, who is in remission after receiving intensive chemotherapy for acute myeloid leukaemia, has welcomed the initiative which will help his ongoing recovery. He said: "Going to the gym and staying active has helped me recover physically and mentally from intensive chemotherapy and a five-week spell in the Intensive Care Unit. That's why I'm delighted with the introduction of this 12-session fitness pass, which will ensure I can keep as physically fit as possible and will be vital if I need any more treatment.'

The grant has also funded the Stars Appeal staff counselling service for a further year to continue supporting Hospital staff. The service employs two dedicated staff counsellors who provide 100 counselling sessions each

Stars Appeal Staff Counsellor Pamela Kirkham said: "To know we have secured funding for a further year from NHS Charities Together is

"Taking care of our own mental health is essential in order to continue providing high quality care for the local community. It is known that early intervention reduces the risk of time away from work, and this service offers prompt and easy access for staff to receive support during difficult times. It is a privilege to be able to offer this extremely valuable service to the staff at Salisbury Hospital and this funding will enable myself and my Marathon in support of the Stars Appeal. team to continue to do so."

MUM TREATED FOR BREAST CANCER TO TAKE ON **LONDON MARATHON!**



A Salisbury mum who was treated for cancer is taking on the London Marathon to support the Stars Appeal, Salisbury Hospital's Charity.

lo Cullen, who was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2022, wanted to run the marathon on Sunday, April 21, to "give back" to the Breast Unit at Salisbury District Hospital for the care she received.

The 50-year-old did a virtual London Marathon in 2020 so this will be her first time doing the event in London. She had been due to run it in 2022 but was forced to pull out after receiving her cancer diagnosis.

"Getting my cancer diagnosis was a big shock but I was very lucky to catch it early," explains lo, who had surgery to remove the lump followed by a mastectomy and reconstructive surgery. "Nearly two years after my diagnosis, with all my treatment behind me, I am finally able to run the London Marathon after having to defer my entry twice due to surgery. I just want to finish and raise as much money as I can for the Breast Unit."

The Stars Appeal Breast Unit, which opened in 2017, is Salisbury Hospital's first-ever dedicated unit for breast patients providing dedicated diagnostic equipment along with treatment and counselling rooms in a beautifully furnished and dignified environment. It enables patients to have their diagnosis and follow-up care delivered in one place, reducing the need for patients to visit other departments in the hospital

"We're very lucky in Salisbury to have such a wonderful Breast Unit on the doorstep. The nurses and consultants were absolutely amazing from the moment I was diagnosed to all my operations. They are still at the end of the phone to answer any questions or concerns. It feels like you're not alone, and they've got you under their wing."

She also praised the lovely décor and furnishings in the unit, which she says make it feel "very special".

"I'm so grateful for all the work the Stars Appeal do. It is vital to people like me to have places like the Breast Unit. I really felt strongly about raising money for the Stars Appeal and to give back to a charity that has helped me and hundreds of other people," said Jo.

Sophie Bagshaw, from Ludgershall, who is a second year Adult Nursing student at Bournemouth University doing a placement at Salisbury Hospital, is also lacing up her running shoes to take on her first London

The 20-year-old said: "While doing my placement at the hospital it was a surprise to me how much was funded by the Stars Appeal and I wanted to contribute. Salisbury is also my local hospital that I've used for years so I wanted to give back."



TECHNEWS



YOUR MONTHLY TECH UPDATE

CHRIS RYU

Welcome back to my new column where I give you a brief overview of what's changing in the world of technology and how it will affect you in Marnhull. We have a broad range of readers and so I'd love to hear your feedback on the level of detail I give and the types of technology I cover, so that I can adapt in future issues. Let's dive right in...



THE WORLD WAS NOT READY FOR IT

Humane AI have finally released their hotly anticipated "AI pin". The product is actually quite a good idea at it's heart. It's a small badge that you wear on your clothing, secured by a magnet inside. Using a built in camera, speaker and various microphones, it was supposed to make your life easier. It was marketed as a replacement to the mobile phone. The idea is to pull people away from apps and screens, as the Al can use the apps for you. If a display is needed for a set task, the pin can project the data onto your hand and using the camera, can pick out what option you want... or that's the idea anyway.

The concept is that it learns from you over time and so can begin automating tasks. It can make calls for you, send messages, manage your diary and lots of time saving, hands-free activities.

In reality the product shipped is far from the concept sold. By removing a screen, the user needs to learn an array of hand gestures. These have been shown to be far from reliable. It's slow, causing long delays between asking the pin a question and getting a Chat-gpt style answer. The answers lack logic sometimes

too in my opinion. There's reports of the device getting very hot - extra worrying when it's a device you wear. Most surprising to me was the company's lead developer saying publically that the device is annoying sometimes! They will push software updates and I'm sure it'll get better, but at £560 upfront and £20/m you can imagine why customers are so

For comparison, a rival AI pin that's open for pre-orders, Rabbit R1 is £160 with no subscription. It takes a different approach using a screen and is currently performing much better in tests.

Apple Repair Improvements

As someone that previously owned an iPhone repair shop, I'm always moaning about their poor approach to repairs. The EU have been cracking down on Apple and are gradually forcing brands to allow consumers to have a right to repair their products. One of the most frustrating things about Apple repairs is "software locking". We could take 2 brand new iphones, swap some parts over and both devices would report that we've used counterfeit parts, some features would be disabled and in some cases, performance limited.

To clarify; in most cases brand new parts will be detected as counterfeit as they weren't paired with the phone/tablet in the factory.

Apple have now announced that it will begin allowing repairs using used parts. This is great news and long overdue. This will extend the life of lots of Apple devices and rescue iPhones that have been abandoned in

Al Round Up

It almost seems like there's a huge leap forward every month at the moment. I could probably fill the whole magazine! This month I just want to highlight one cool tool.

Udio is a really fun music generator. Using a few lines of text you can generator music in any genre, including lyrics and the quality is really surprising. It's in Beta right now, but it's already a lot of fun.

NEW TECH ROUND-UP

- Intel announced their latest processor socket design. It's not vet clear what all the new pins do, but I'm sure we'll find out soon enough.
- Google held their popular "IO" event and unveiled new devices. The Pixel 9 will get the emergency satelitte calling made popular by Apple and the new 8a is a more budget friendly option
- Google's rather impressive Al photo editing tools that were exclusive to Pixel users are now being rolled out to all Google photo users - no subscription required. My favourite feature is being able to unblur photos, or reproduce old damaged photos.
- It's been leaked that Apple plans to overhaul the entire Mac line with new AI focused M4 chips. They're expected to be announced in the last quarter of this year. That's all for this month - see you next time!







THE FIRST **OF MAY**

The First of May.

Welcome to Dorset Lore, a monthly column featuring the rich heritage of folklore, tradition, ghost stories and legends of the county of Dorset. This month we of course must explore May traditions.

I can find no record of a traditional Jack-in-the-Green parading through Marnhull, but one was recorded in Shaftesbury that was carried about with its retinue asking for pennies. In Sherborne on May Day the children would go around with garlands and they decorated themselves with chains of flowers, wore wreaths and chanted a song which began:

"The first of May

Is garland day

Please to remember

The King and Queen."

"The Maypole, said at one time to be the tallest in England, was garlanded with flowers, and around the Maypole dancing was kept up far into the night. Besides the dancing there were booths, coconut shies, cheapo jacks [a seller of cheap or inferior quality goods]. and all the appurtenances of a fair. But the last Maypole disappeared from the village green before the war of 1939-1945. At Cerne Abbas was another famous Maypole, which stood near the Giant on the hill'

"At Wyke Regis and Abbotsbury on May 13th and 14th the children used to make garlands of flowers and skip with them through the street and then hang them on the fishing boats. When the boats went to sea, the garlands were thrown overboard into the waters of West Bay."

In Marnhull a feast day was held on the last Wednesday in May. It was:

"A great day for the whole of the village. Church bells rang early: members met at The Crown with ribbons and favours. And attended service at the church. They afterwards paraded the village with their flags and garlands and visited every house and farm-house of importance where they were plentifully supplied with ale and cider, and dancing was indulged in (the old fashioned four-handed reel being the favourite), after which they proceeded to The Crown for dinner where parson and squire, farmer and man, sat down together to enjoy the good things provided. In the evening the two breweries were visited, where ale was supplied and more dancing indulged in. No sports were held, but wrestling and cudgel playing used to take place." This comes from the wonderful 'Dorset up along and down along' first published in 1935. I have already gathered lots of folklore specific to Marnhull and surrounding villages and would be very interested to hear what stories locals recall, what their sources are, and what variations there are of the stories I have already researched.

Animal allergens in vegan and plant-based food

The Food Standards Agency is running a campaign to advise people with milk, egg, fish or shellfish allergies, or those who care for people with these types of allergies, to always check the label on vegan and plantbased food as it may not be safe to eat.

Foods marked as vegan or plant-based are not guaranteed to be free from products of animal origin, and therefore could still contain allergenic ingredients. This is because a vegan label is not a food safety label so risks remain of cross-contamination in manufacturing and production processes that might mean vegan or plant-based food is not safe for some people to

Q: Do you know the difference between a 'free-from' and 'vegan' label?

A: A 'free-from' label guarantees the product doesn't contain the named allergen. To use this label, food businesses must follow strict processes to ensure the allergen isn't present.

However, these rules don't apply to vegan or plant-based products, which means there could be a chance of cross-contamination with allergens such as milk, eggs, fish or shellfish.

Q: Do you have an allergy to milk, eggs, fish, or shellfish? Do you eat vegan food to help manage your allergies?

A: Vegan food isn't always safe for people with these allergies because of potential cross-contamination during manufacturing and preparation

For peace of mind that ingredients such as milk, eggs, fish, or shellfish aren't present in vegan food or plant-based food through cross-contamination, always check for precautionary allergen labels such as a 'may contain' statement. This will help prevent an allergic reaction.

The Food Standards Agency advises - Never assume vegan or plant-based food is safe for people with certain allergies. Don't take the risk. Always




